

Beginning May 1, we Catholics from the Fargo Diocese, are once again obliged to go to Sunday Mass. Bishop Folda has lifted the dispensation. That means, beginning May 1, Mass attendance on Sundays or Saturday evenings is a requirement for Catholics

# What it Means to Have the Mass Dispensation Lifted.

Canon law states, "On Sundays and other holy days of obligation, the faithful are obliged to participate in the Mass." There is the reason behind the rule.

The Catechism of the Catholic Church calls the Eucharist "the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice." As a result, "the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin."

Look at your lives at this moment. Are you meeting with groups of people, perhaps attending sporting events and participating in other forms of entertainment, but not attending Mass? The Holy Eucharist is the source and summit of our faith, but are we making other things a priority in our lives at this time?

We hope to see you all at Mass soon, we miss you!

# Reflections on the Gospel - 4<sup>th</sup> SUNDAY OF EASTER - April 25<sup>th</sup>, 2021 Fr. Gary Luiten

Sheep are not too common around here anymore, and so neither are those who watch over them: their shepherds. So, what are the qualities of a good shepherd? A good shepherd would be one who cares about the sheep. They have their best interests at heart. They have invested a lot of time and money in them, and they are going to want to make sure that the sheep are well-fed and stay healthy.

Those are the qualities of Jesus, too, the good shepherd. He wants to make sure that we are spiritually well-fed and that we stay healthy, or become healthy, spiritually, in our relationship with the Father. You and I are called to realize that we are not the ultimate bosses of our lives. The saying goes, "Not everyone can be the boss." We can also say, "Not everyone can be the shepherd." And it takes a virtuous person to become docile to Christ and to the teachings He gives us.

You and I are called to be docile to what God wants of us each day – not to be prideful and think that we know better than God, but to allow the Lord to do His work – to allow Jesus to be the shepherd of our lives. And this is done through prayer – a close, day-to-day relationship with the father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and with our Blessed mother. And we have nothing to worry about when we allow Jesus to become our shepherd, because, as the scripture says, Jesus is the GOOD shepherd.

The second point of the gospel today is that we are the sheep. If you ask most farmers why they don't raise sheep anymore, most likely they'll tell you that it is because sheep don't bring in any money. For us, on the contrary, we ARE worth something to God. If you don't think you are worth anything to God, remember that He has purchased us at a great price: by shedding His blood. And, although we may realize that we are worth a lot to God, we, like, sheep, have a tendency at times to stray when it comes to the things that concern our spiritual welfare. There is the tendency to ramble away from the flock to nibble at bits of forbidden pasture. However, we have a shepherd who understands us, one whose patience and love are infinite, always ready to receive us back.

Today's gospel is a call to those who have left the church. The problem is that they didn't hear the message today! The sad fact is that you and I may be the only gospel some people will ever hear. You and I are called to bring the message of Jesus Christ to others by what we say, what we do, and the example we set.

May we not shut our ears to this call of Christ today. May we give Jesus a helping hand by helping our fellow brothers and sisters to see the light of the true faith through our example of docility in our relationship with the Good Shepherd.


# 10 Facts about St. Joseph The Worker

Exerts from Jenna Kandas, April 30, 2020

May 1<sup>st</sup> is the feast of St. Joseph The Worker. While not the primary celebration of St. Joseph, this feast allows us to celebrate St. Joseph in a way that we can all relate to him - as workers! We each work - at home, in the world, at school - so we can each draw strength from this humble saint.

- Patron of a multitude. Joseph is the patron saint of many things, including the universal Church, fathers, the dying, social justice, unborn children, travelers, immigrants, a happy death, families, expectant mothers, travelers, house sellers and buyers, craftsmen, engineers, and working people in general.
- 2. Pope Pius XII Established the Feast Day. In 1955, Pius XII established the feast day of St. Joseph the Worker, explaining that "The spirit flows to you and to all men from the heart of the God -man, Savior of the world, but certainly, no worker was ever more completely and profoundly penetrated by it than the foster father of Jesus, who lived with Him in closest intimacy and community of family life and work."

- 3. He is patron of the Universal Church. In 1870, Pius IX declared St. Joseph patron of the Universal Church.
- **4.** A man of many descriptors. In the Litany of St. Joseph, he is referred to as "the terror of demons," the "glory of home life," and "model of artisans" amongst other descriptors.
- Quoteless in the Bible. There is not one single quote from St. Joseph in the Bible, and only a few details of his life were recorded for us.
- 6. We have tradition on his death. According to tradition, Joseph died in the arms of Jesus and Mary, which is why he is considered the model of the pious believer who receives grace at the moment of death, in other words, the patron of a happy death.
- March is his month. The month of March is dedicated to St. Joseph and his primary feast day (Solemnity of St. Joseph, husband of Mary) is March 19.
- 8. A possible third feast day. It could be argued that St. Joseph has a third feast day since he is a part of the Holy Family and we honor the Feast of the Holy Family on December 30.
- 9. Long history of devotion. Devotion for St. Joseph goes back to at least the 9th century, when he was commonly referred to as "nutritor Domini" meaning "guardian of the Lord."
- 10. Patron of several countries. He is the patron of the Americas, Canada, China, Croatia, Mexico, Korea, Austria, Belgium, Peru, the Philippines, and Vietnam.


