


The Third Week of Advent

<u>Candle Name</u>: the Shepherd's Candle <u>The Third Week of Advent Represents</u>: **Joy** Candle Color: Pink

This third candle is pink and symbolizes rejoicing. During the third week of Advent, we are filled with joy for the near arrival of Jesus on Christmas day. This Sunday is often called "Gaudete Sunday" as we reflect on the joy the shepherd's felt at the birth of Jesus.

Who is St. Nicholas?

St. Nicholas was a bishop of an ancient Greek town called Myra, in present-day Turkey. He was born around March 15, 270 and died on December 6, 343.

St. Nicholas always had a love for the poor and would work for their benefit. The story goes that there was a poor man in town with no money for a dowry for his daughters. No dowry meant no marriage, which would have left his daughters to be sold into a life of servitude. Later one night, St. Nicholas dropped a bag of money down the chimney of the family home, thus allowing the daughters a dowry.

Most famously, he is the real-life historical figure from whom we get Santa Claus. His generosity inspired the "chubby and plump, a right jolly old elf"

Santa meaning Saint and

Claus is short for Nicholas.

The story of St. Nicholas is fun to know and a great way to remind us, and our children that Christmas is about more than just presents.

Reflections by Fr. Gary Luiten



The Third Sunday in Advent-December 17, 2023

You may notice a lot of lights this time of year, in the midst of the darkness. People have Christmas lights up in their yards. They have decorated their trees and homes. John the Baptist talks about light, too, in the gospel, which give us cause to rejoice. This light is Jesus Christ, who eventually came to John to be baptized. And so, all these lights we see at this dark time of year give us cause to think about the one, true light, from which the light of truth and justice has come, which is Jesus.

Jesus also calls you and me to be the light. In Matthew, chapter 5, Jesus calls us to be the light of the world. To be the light of the world means that we can do what Isaiah did in the first reading, we can proclaim liberty to the captives. The captives today include those who are held captive because of grudges or sins that they carry. We can be God's instruments of healing. We can direct them to Jesus and even to sacramental forgiveness. We can be the light of the world by announcing a year of favor through the joy in our hearts, even in the midst of present trials and sufferings, as we look forward to the reward which awaits us.

And so, as we go forth and make the preparations for Christmas, let us remember that God has called us to be lights in a world of darkness, to be beacons of hope by our words and example in a world that in many ways has lost sight of God. Even in the midst of the darkness and storms in the world around us, we can be instruments of God's light to those around us by keeping the love and light of Christ in our hearts.

National Eucharistic Pilgrimage

Walking Coast to Coast With Our Eucharistic Lord!

The National Eucharistic Pilgrimage (procession) is a truly unique initiative. This is a beautiful fusion of the journey **TO** Jesus and the journey **WITH** Jesus. What's more, it is an adventure that all Catholics can do together, either by interior disposition or physical accompaniment.

This is the birth of something remarkable. Join us as we accompany Jesus in the Eucharist from the north, south, east, and west edges of our country, stopping at many holy sites and churches along the way. Each route is scheduled to arrive in Indianapolis IN, on July 21 to join the National Eucharistic Congress, where Jesus comes to encounter His people anew.

The four routes will come from the North (Minnesota), South (Texas), East (Connecticut), and West (California).

The Eastern Route, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton Route is leaving from New Haven, Connecticut, the eastern arm of the Pilgrimage will begin near the Atlantic coast, journey through our nation's oldest diocese, and cross the Appalachian Mountains. The Seton Route will be punctuated by many meaningful stops. Pilgrims will visit holy sites, embrace the sacraments daily, and publicly proclaim Christ's Real Presence in the Eucharist as they accompany him on his way to the 10th National Eucharistic Congress. Make your plans now to meet up with this historic Pilgrimage!

This Route is named for **St. Elizabeth Ann Seton**, the first American-born saint to be canonized by the Catholic Church. A lifelong protestant, the young mother was drawn to the Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. St. Elizabeth Ann opened the first free Catholic school for girls in America in 1810. Her work laid the foundation for what is now the parochial school system.
