

# Reflections by Fr. Gary Luiten



the 4th Sunday of Lent - March 10, 2024

We all know what it is like to sin. St. Paul says in the Romans "all have sinned." The Israelites were like this. They offended God by not keeping the Lord as their god. And so, the Lord allowed a pagan king to enter, capture them, and exile them to the foreign land of Babylon. The Israelites in exile dreamed of being home, dreaming of the "good ol' days." They were homesick! Psalm 137 states, "By the rivers of Babylon we sat there and wept, remembering Zion, our hometown, and hung up our harps. We were so sad we couldn't even play our musical instruments."

But we know that to get to our final home, we must first die, in a physical sense, and in a spiritual sense. Though Jesus says in the gospel that "those who believe in Jesus will not die but have everlasting life," he is speaking of a physical and spiritual death which lasts forever. But Jesus saves us from this tragic end. And so, in order to talk about living forever, we must talk about dying.

The spiritual kind of death, the dying-to-self, really involves dying to sin. Then we will be spiritually ready to meet God. First, we must admit that we have sinned. This we do at the beginning of Mass. Second, we must ask for forgiveness. This we do regarding our small sins at mass, and when we make an act of contrition. Asking forgiveness is what we do regarding our small and especially our big sins, in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. Then we have complete assurance that our sins are forgiven and that we are ready to meet God not only when we die, but also when we meet God in the other Sacraments.

So may God give us the grace to die to our sinfulness. Then we may truly be able to live, and to understand and appreciate the gift of new life in Christ. And as the Lord led the Israelites back to their true home after being exiled, so may God lead us one day to our true home in Heaven.

# A Brief Examination of Conscience

**Based on the Ten Commandments** 

I am the Lord your God: you shall not have strange Gods before me.

Have I treated people, events, or things as more important that God?

You shall not take the name of the Lord your God in vain.

Have my words, actively or passively, put down God, the Church, or people?

Remember to keep holy the Lord's Day.

Do I go to Mass every Sunday (or Saturday Vigil) and on Holy Days of Obligation (Jan. 1; the Ascension; Aug. 15; Nov. 1; Dec. 8; Dec. 25)? Do I avoid, when possible, work that impedes worship to God, joy for the Lord's Day, and proper relaxation of mind and body? Do I look for ways to spend time with family or in service on Sunday?

Honor your father and your mother.

Do I show my parents due respect? Do I seek to maintain good communication with my parents where possible? Do I criticize them for lacking skills I think they should have?

You shall not kill.

Have I harmed another through physical, verbal, or emotional means, including gossip or manipulation of any kind?

You shall not commit adultery.

Have I respected the physical and sexual dignity of others and of myself?

You shall not steal.

Have I taken or wasted time or resources that belonged to another?

You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.

Have I gossiped, told lies, or embellished stories at the expense of another?

You shall not covet your neighbor's spouse.

Have I honored my spouse with my full affection and exclusive love?

You shall not covet your neighbor's goods.

Am I content with my own means and needs, or do I compare myself to others unnecessarily?

#### **Christ's Two Commandments**

How well do we love God and others? Do we love as Christ calls us to? In the gospel of Matthew, Christ gives us Two Commandments: "He said to him, 'You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment. The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself. The whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments" Mt 22:37-40.

Not Sure what love is? St. Paul describes it for us in his Letter to the Corinthians. Is this how you love God and others: "Love is patient, love is kind, it is not jealous, (love) is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things, Love never fails" 1 Cor 13:4-8.

Fasting for Lent: 11 ideas for kids, teens, and families

When encouraging your kids to fast, help them brainstorm some creative ideas. A positive experience is more likely if you make the fast concrete and measurable. For example, instead of saying, "I'll stop fighting with my sister," sit down and figure out specific actions that will lead to a "conversion" in this area. Determine what the problems are and make that part of the fast. Use charts, a special jar, or some way to track the progress of the fast. Some ideas:

- 1. Give up the usual suspects such as sweets, video games, soda, junk food, social media, and other creature comforts.
- Quiet it down. Practice periods of silence in order to better hear God. Turn off
  radios, television, music devices, phones, and develop that time of day where
  silence is golden and determine how much time each day will be devoted to periods
  of silence to focus on God.
- 3. Make their room a desert or your home a desert. Jesus spent forty days in the desert. Your family can imitate his example by making rooms more desert- like by removing pictures, posters, favorite toys, emptying closets and dressers of everything except essential clothing. Store these items.
- 4. Slim down wardrobes. Have each family member will take inventory of clothing items and determine what they will wear during the period of fasting. Consider donating what wasn't worn.
- 5. Perform random acts of kindness every day. Doing it secretly makes it more fun. See RandomActsOfKindness.org for ideas.
- 6. Write your fight. Instead of verbal squabbles, write down complaints. Make a form to use which includes guidelines for rephrasing complaints using respectful language.
- 7. Pray it up. Each family member can carry a rosary with them using it to pray through the day. Any set of beads, such as a necklace or bracelet could be used.
- 8. Wear your faith. Encourage wearing Christian symbols as a witness to your faith.
- Share. Encourage positive sharing each week, inviting each other into an activity or conversation. Or encourage sharing a portion of their allowance or savings and donate to a charity of their choice.
- 10. Practice being present. Commit to putting down your phones or other electronic devices when someone is present. Create phone free, or device free zones, like the dinner table.
- 11. Get to know Jesus. Have a family member read one of the Gospels or read it together as a family over the course of Lent. Develop times of days to read or to pray together.
