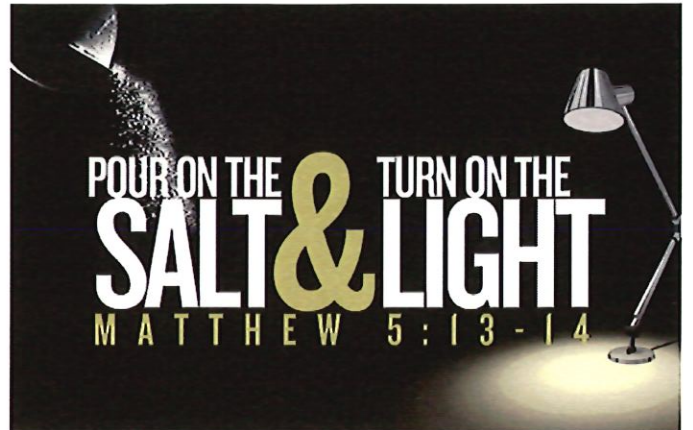

## **PARTS OF THE MASS continued...**

This is a continuation of the Liturgy of the Eucharist (part 2 of 2).

### **Communion Rite**

The Communion Rite follows the Eucharistic Prayer, leading the faithful to the Eucharistic table.

The rite begins with the Lord's Prayer. Jesus taught this prayer to his disciples when they asked how to pray (cf. Mt 6:9-13, Lk 11:2-4). In this prayer, the people join their voices to pray for the coming of God's kingdom and to ask God to provide for our needs, forgive our sins, and bring us to the joy of heaven.

The Rite of Peace follows. The celebrant prays that the peace of Christ will fill our hearts, our families, our Church, our communities, and our world. As a sign of hope, the people extend to those around them a sign of peace.

In the Fraction Rite, the celebrant breaks the consecrated bread as the people sing the *Agnus Dei* or "Lamb of God." John the Baptist proclaimed Jesus as "the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (Jn 1:29). The action of breaking the bread recalls the actions of Jesus at the Last Supper, when he broke the bread before giving it to his disciples. One of the earliest names for the Eucharistic celebration is the breaking of the bread (Lk 24:35; Acts 2:42, 46).

Before receiving Holy Communion, the celebrant and assembly acknowledge their unworthiness to receive so great a gift. The celebrant receives Holy Communion first and then the people come forward.

Those who receive Holy Communion should be prepared to receive so great a gift. They should fast (except for medicines) for at least one hour before receiving the Eucharist and should not be conscious of having committed serious sin.

Because sharing at the Eucharistic Table is a sign of unity in the Body of Christ, only those in communion with the Catholic Church may receive Holy Communion. To invite others present to receive Holy Communion implies a unity which does not exist. Those who do not receive Holy Communion still participate in this rite by praying for unity with Christ and with each other.

The people approach the altar and, bowing with reverence, receive Holy Communion. People may receive the Body of Christ either on the tongue or in the hand. The priest or other minister offers the Eucharist to each person saying, "The Body of Christ." The person receiving responds by saying, "Amen," a Hebrew word meaning, "So be it" (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 2856).

As the people receive Holy Communion, the

communion chant/song is sung. The unity of voices echoes the unity the Eucharist brings. All may spend some time in silent prayer of thanksgiving as well.

The Communion Rite ends with the Prayer after Communion which asks that the benefits of the Eucharist will remain active in our daily lives.

## **Reflections by Fr. Gary Luiten**

### **the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in Ordinary Time Sunday, Feb. 8, 2026**

Jesus this weekend calls us the light of the world. In other words, if we do not let our light shine, then the world has no light! That is, the world is then in spiritual darkness, which would be a terrible thing. You and I, because we are the light of the world, have the ability to build one another up and encourage one another because we have Jesus in our lives! When we see Christ in others and act as Christ would act, then we are becoming the best version of ourselves that we can be.

Jesus also says we are the salt of the earth. Food without a little salt doesn't normally taste as good. Salt gives it that added flavor. It takes away the dullness that food can have at times. And when we hide our light under a bushel basket, we, as the salt of the earth, become dull and flat. Being the salt of the earth involves not just acting and speaking, but

also listening to others – just simply being there for them. So, as we live our lives at Blessed Sacrament may the Lord help us to be the salt of the earth, and the light of the world, guiding others to the truth, to safety and security in Christ Jesus.

**What are the Stations of the Cross?** Stations of the Cross are representations of the path Jesus took on his way to be crucified. Jesus endured suffering, insults, and moments of support. 'Stations' relays the intense sacrifice that Jesus undertook for human salvation. Stations are as follows:

- Jesus is condemned.
- Jesus takes up his cross.
- Jesus falls the first time.
- Jesus meets Mary.
- Simon helps carry the cross.
- Veronica consoles Jesus.
- Jesus falls a second time.
- Jesus consoles the women.
- Jesus falls a third time.
- Jesus is stripped of his garments.
- Jesus is nailed to the cross.
- Jesus dies.
- Jesus is taken down from the cross.
- Jesus is placed in a tomb.

On Friday's, during Lent, we reflect and pray the Stations of the Cross at 7:00 p.m.. Please join us.

**What Should You Give Up for Lent?**

When was the last time you had a really memorable Lent? Or even a life-changing Lent? So often we just give up something like chocolate like we always have, without giving it much thought. And we don't really stick to it. Or if we do manage to get to Easter without eating said chocolate, we realize we haven't really grown spiritually since the beginning of Lent. And *isn't that actually the point?*

*The point of giving something up, of fasting, is to cultivate the inner life.* When we fast, we realize how truly dependent on God we are. We open our hearts, our minds, and our bodies to God's love in our lives. We look at the ways that we need to grow, and dedicate ourselves to becoming a-better-version-of-ourselves. And when we make ourselves

available to God, incredible things can happen. That's what can make Lent so powerful. But you can take it one step further. Don't just give something up. *There is also great value in doing something for Lent.* It's the perfect time not only to abandon self-destructive habits, but also to form new life-giving habits, habits that can extend beyond the 40 days of Lent. Give something up, eliminate a bad habit from your life, and then fill that gap intentionally. Look at how you can become a better-version-of-yourself, and commit to a New Good Habit.

## Things to Give Up For Lent

**Don't eat what you want.** Don't leave the dinner table without making an act of self-denial. Take that to heart at every meal this Lent. If you want waffles for breakfast, make eggs instead. Instead of drinking orange juice, drink water.

**Give something away - every day.** It doesn't need to be money or material things-though giving these away can be a powerful experience. Try complimenting a stranger, teach someone how to do something, spread a positive message, help someone who is in a hurry, or simply smile at someone. You don't need money or material possessions to live a life of staggering generosity! Give something away-every day.

**Don't interrupt people.** Spend more time listening, and less time interjecting.

**Stop complaining.** Have you ever stopped to think about how many times a day you complain about something? What if, instead, you find constructive ways to talk about your difficulties? What if you look for the good in people instead of focusing on any inconvenience we experience?

**Don't waste downtime.** You don't have to give up social media entirely, but you can be intentional about not using it during specific times. Take that time instead to pray, to breathe, to reach out to someone around you. You'll be amazed at the difference it can make in your day.

## Things To Do For Lent

**Spend time in the classroom of silence.** No habit will change your life more than stepping into the classroom of silence each day, sitting down with God, and spending a few minutes in prayer and reflection. Even just 10 minutes a day has the potential to completely transform your Lent...and your life!

**Join a spiritual challenge.** One of the simplest ways to transform your Lent is to join other Catholics for a spiritual challenge. You could create a small challenge with your friends, sign up for a local Bible study, join the Best Lent Ever, by Matthew Kelly.

**Read the gospels.** Pick one Gospel - Matthew, Mark, Luke, or John - and read it all the way through during Lent. Just reading for 10 or 15 minutes a day is plenty of time to accomplish that. It is in reading the Gospels that we can realize that Jesus is not just a historical figure. He is alive and with us in everything we do.

**Sit in a church.** Stop by a church for a few moments each day during Lent. Sitting in a quiet, empty church is a beautiful experience. Just you and God. There is something powerful about that.

**Create a holy moment every day.** Send a kind note to a loved one, do a good deed for a stranger, volunteer, post something inspiring on social media. It doesn't have to be big - just do something each day.

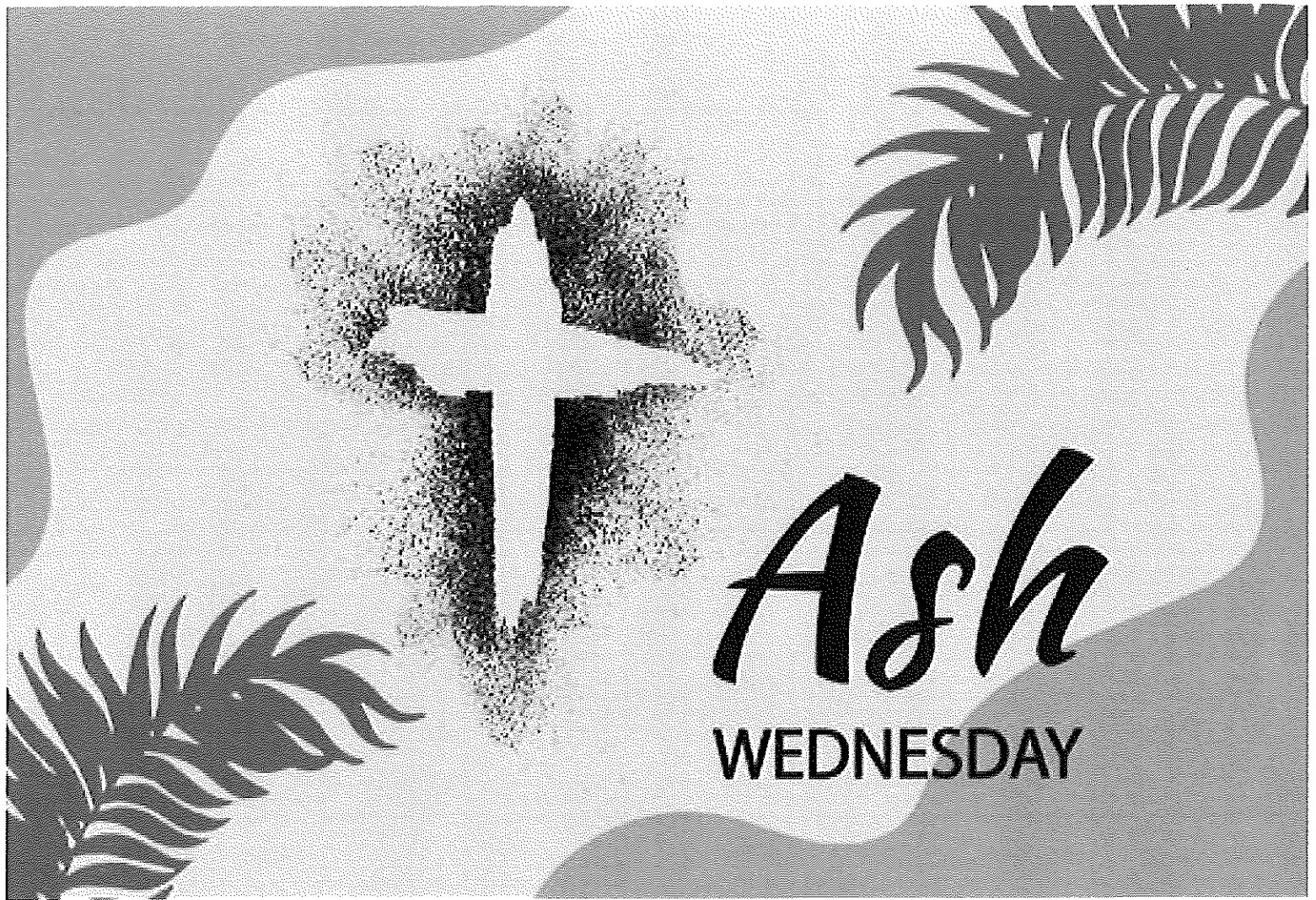
